

This year was the most challenging year faced by MEL and its members since its inception.

A combination of the COVID-19 pandemic, natural disasters, state and judicial decisions, and continued cyber-related criminal activity continue to accelerate losses and the cost of coverages.

- COVID related claims are expected to increase workers' compensation claims over \$25 million for MEL/ JIF members, considering the potential impact of long-term COVID cases.
- The Department of Labor decision directing public entities to pay permanency costs related to accidental disability formerly paid by pension plans is expected to increase workers compensation cost 11%.
- Dramatic increases in catastrophic claims resulting from the increasing number of natural disasters are expected to increase property insurance cost 10% as well as impacting liability and workers' compensation costs.

- The amendment to the sexual molestation statute of limitations is expected to increase liability costs 6%.
- Cyber attacks on municipal governments have increased claims and excess premium costs over 90%.

Despite these challenges, MEL continued to produce positive results and the services and support needed by MEL/JIF members:

- The MEL has generated \$3.6 billion in savings for its members resulting from its successful effort to improve workplace safety. The current total includes \$335 million in dividends paid directly to the members.
- A model policy for the protection and treatment of minors was developed and over 5,000 elected officials and supervisory employees received instructor-led training regarding the state policy.
- The MEL Cyber Task Force developed an updated version of its risk management program. A Cyber



JIF is being organized to manage this risk more effectively. Coverage deductibles and limits may be tailored to members' level of risk control. Expert vendors will be retained to provide hands on assistance to the Cyber JIF participants.

- The E-JIF continues to provide a full range of environmental coverages and offers the broadest pollution coverage available from any source for its members, saving them millions in costs.
- Attendance at MSI online and in-person training programs now exceeds 70,000 - dramatically reducing lost time accident frequency.

The MEL Mobile App, redesigned MEL website and the Power of Collaboration reference book provide immediate access to authoritative, up to date and timely information for public officials and administrators.

Ongoing access to training and resources has helped MEL/JIF members develop workforces trained to respond to tough challenges like those we have faced for the past several years.

THE NJ MEL MOBILE APP

The NJ MEL App provides immediate access to information and resources regarding safety, risk management, training, and special events to keep you informed, compliant, safe and secure. Free and available on both Apple and Android platforms, the App can be customized to provide the information you need and delivers push notifications regarding emergencies, regulatory updates, classes, and specialized information.





The MEL Safety Institute (MSI) is a major source of online training resources specifically tailored to meet the needs of MEL/JIF members.

Over 70,000 training events were recorded in 2022, following a 35% increase in the prior two years. As a result, the accident frequency rate remains well below its pre-pandemic level - a direct and measureable benefit in reduced workers' compensation costs. The reduction demonstrates the importance of high quality, accessible training - and the benefit it provides to members.

ACCESSIBLE TRAINING PLATFORMS

MSI offers training on three accessible platforms:

- MSI Live: 40 online safety and risk control courses. Included are interactive instructor-led, courses on a broad spectrum of safety and risk control topics including those specifically designed for law enforcement officers. Most courses are approved for a variety of CEU credits.
- MSI NOW: 200 live streaming training videos developed by the MSI staff are available directly from the MEL website and are available on demand.

MSI DVD: 450 titles on a wide variety of important safety issues are available.

THE MSI LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

MSI created the MSI Leadership Academy to recognize the commitment of public administrators to training specifically designed to strengthen leadership performance. Four required courses include an in-depth review of risk management, ethics, implicit bias at the workplace, and practical leadership skills. To participate in the Academy, four electives must also be selected from a list of 20 management related courses available on the MEL website. The courses address communication skills, conflict resolution, stress management and team building, and are available in virtual and in-person options. Graduates will be recognized for their participation.

TRAINING AND MODEL POLICIES FOR THE PROTECTION OF MINORS

MEL developed a model policy and training program for the protection and safe treatment of minors to address the extension of the statute of limitations

concerning sexual molestation claims. A list of vendors for performing background checks was developed for the program.

Over 5,000 elected officials and supervisory employees have completed the virtual instructor led MSI training program which was made available in the evenings to accommodate work schedules.

In addition, the following courses were developed or expanded:

- A training video for all employees and volunteers
- The Camp Counselor training program was expanded to include a module regarding the sexual abuse of minors.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Elected Officials Risk Management Seminar on employment practices liability was also made available online. A webinar titled *Public Officials - What You Need to Know* was developed to provide a regulatory and safety overview for newly appointed public officials and JIF leaders.

BULLETINS AND VIDEO BRIEFINGS

Safety bulletins and video briefings were released throughout the year on a broad range of issues including risk management strategies for lifeguards, recreational cannabis, office safety, OSHA record keeping, exiting and entering fire trucks and workplace ergonomics.

LAW ENFORCEMENT INITIATIVE WEBPAGE

Access to law enforcement video briefings, bulletins on a variety of essential topics and information regarding risk analysis are available on the website. In addition, mandatory police command training continues. Resources and training support have been provided in-person wherever possible. A training program on Critical Incident Debriefing has been added to the webpage.

FIRE SERVICE

The website now contains a special section that includes model policies, procedures, training videos and training program lesson plans to assist firefighters.

THE MEL APP

The MEL App is a primary source of up-to-date information on a wide variety of topics and alerts. Members can designate their area of interest and receive timely information on issues affecting safety, employment practices and public policies affecting their communities. Push notifications are sent to alert members immediately regarding issues that are of vital importance.


